

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES**

he Administrative Services Department is the service-oriented backbone of the CRC that provides a lasting professional impression through **secretarial**, **public relations**, **human resources**, and **maintenance** operations.

The Secretary/Receptionist is now responsible for signing out vehicles to employees and keeping up with the mileage and advising when maintenance is needed. This year, she produced the Annual Report/Calendar. She also continues to be responsible for requisitioning/ordering supplies; serving as key operator of the copiers and postage machine; assisting departments as needed with various projects; answering the CRC's main phone line and greeting guests and visitors to the CRC office.

The HR Transit Coordinator completed CPR Instructor Training and is now a Certified CPR Instructor through the American Red Cross. Driver CPR Training can now be conducted inhouse and the Coordinator will continue to oversee the other required FTA/GDOT trainings required for drivers. In addition to ensuring the CRC's Drug & Alcohol Policy is followed, FTA required updates and they were made to the CRC's Transportation Drug & Alcohol Policy this past year. The Coordinator also continued HR duties involving paperwork for new hire, orientations, terminations, insurance, open enrollment, 401K, defined contribution plans, FMLA, workman's comp, and ensured employee evaluations were completed.

The Administrative Services Director/HR handles the agendas, minutes, member appointments and attendance, meeting notices, summations, Bylaws updates, etc., for the CRC Council and Budget & Finance Committee meetings. Annual duties include the update of the City/County Directory (available on the CRC's website) and editing the Annual Report and assisting with the cover design. HR responsibilities include paperwork for new hires, orientation, terminations, job description updates/creation, insurance, FMLA, employee evaluations, retirement applications, employee service recognition, and updating the Employee Handbook as needed. The position also assists all departments as needed.

he Coastal Area Agency on Aging (AAA) was formed in 1973. The AAA strives to develop a comprehensive, coordinated system of services that promotes the independence and well-being of older adults and those with disabilities and their caregivers, and to provide these individuals with information and access to needed services. We serve the Coastal Region, which includes Bryan, Bulloch, Camden, Chatham, Effingham, Glynn, Liberty, Long, and McIntosh Counties.

The AAA remains committed to building lasting partnerships with organizations, private businesses, and local governments to ensure that our most frail and economically disadvantaged elders receive the care and services necessary to sustain health, independence, and dignified lives. The AAA continues its efforts of support services through various programs and initiatives such as: the Aging Services Advisory Council, Care Transitions, Nutrition and Wellness, Community Outreach, Information and Assistance, and Assistive Technology.

#### **Dementia Care Specialist Program (DCSP)**

Coastal Georgia welcomed a **Dementia Care Specialist** and a DCSP this year. The mission of the DCSP is to increase dementia education and awareness, build stronger community partnerships, and support care partners to expand skills and resources to help people living with dementia. The DCSP has three pillars of focus to achieve this mission: 1) **Create a dementia-capable aging** network: Training, Education, Awareness, and Collaboration by providing dementia-specific training for AAA staff, providers, and partners while raising awareness of the importance of early detection and screening; 2) **Create dementia-capable communities** with community outreach and partnerships by providing dementia-specific community education



and driving collaboration within the community; and, 3) **Supporting people living with dementia** and their families, providing education, and developing regional capacity to help people with cognitive concerns and their families while encouraging memory screenings and increased access to diagnostic evaluation.

#### **Innovative Programming**

#### **Case Management Programs**

Through a partnership with the Benjamin Rose Institute on Aging, the Coastal AAA provides a **telephonic support program** called **Care Consultation**. This evidence-based program is a proven care-coaching solution delivered by phone to adults with health conditions and their family caregivers, empowering both to more effectively manage short- and long-term care needs. Care consultants assess program participants to ensure their concerns are identified, addressed, and prioritized. The care consultants help the clients develop an action plan and provide ongoing support.



**Support Options** is a grant program through Cares Funding that allows the AAA to provide supportive services to clients traditionally eligible for Older Americans Act-funded programs. This program was developed to assist older adults and allow them to receive **Options Counseling** services and in-home support options. Using a consumer-directed approach, older adults and family caregivers take an active role in deciding on a care plan and service options that best suits their individual situation and circumstances. Support Options is a customer-driven service model that empowers the clients we serve, honors the clients' choice of services, and helps clients remain independent.



The Southeast Georgia Health System (SGHS) and the AAA continue their partnership of the Coastal Care Transitions Program (CCTP). This fee-based program is predicated on the evidence-based Bridge Model developed by the Illinois Transitional Care Consortium. It is designed to "reduce the number of readmissions by providing high-risk older adults with care coordination for 30 days after discharge." The program is intended to help older adults with chronic conditions from readmitting to the hospital by providing access to community services, resources, education, and coaching. The AAA has assisted 375+older adults with Care Transitions services.

#### **Coastal Living Well Program**

As part of our Coastal Living Well initiative, the AAA offers **evidence-based educational workshops** throughout the region. The evidence-based programs have been studied and proven to work. **Wellness Evidence-Based Services (EBS)** have been expanded with the assistance of community partners and volunteers. EBS target **older adults**, **caregivers**, and **people with disabilities**. There are several EBS workshops offered through the AAA, which include the following:

- Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP)
- Virtual Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (v-CDSMP)
- Chronic Disease Self-Management Education (CDSME)
- Diabetes Self-Management Program (DSMP)
- Powerful Tools for Caregivers (PTC)
- Virtual-Powerful Tools for Caregivers
- A Matter of Balance (AMOB)
- Virtual A Matter of Balance (v-AMOB)
- Virtual-Bingocize
- Bingocize

Face-to-face and virtual workshops are being conducted throughout the region, focusing on engaging older adults and reducing social isolation. Older Adults also receive other group



activities and virtual wellness activities in senior and neighborhood centers. Some activities include nutrition education, exercise & stretching classes, music-therapy classes, chair exercises, arts & crafts, word searches, crossword puzzles, book clubs, bingo, ceramics, knitting, sewing classes, and field trips. Senior citizens are gradually coming back to the centers. All senior centers are now open; however, some continue to offer virtual options for engaging in social activities. The Coastal Living Well Program helps individuals learn skills to manage their health better while maintaining independence and improving their quality of life.

The AAA has expanded another evidence-based program, Bingocize, within the region. Bingocize is a fall prevention program, which focuses on bingo, exercise, and fall prevention education in a one-hour class. The AAA has trained 20+ Bingocize facilitators in the region.

#### Georgia Seniors Farmers Market Nutrition Program (GSFMNP)



The GSFMNP is federally funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The AAA offered the GSFMNP throughout the region and served 1,900 older adults in 34 centers. The AAA achieved a 98% redemption rate. Vouchers were distributed in nine counties, reaching senior centers, adult daycare centers/adult day-health centers, senior apartments, senior high rises/senior apartment complexes, and one community resource center. The program participants were pleased to receive vouchers valued at \$50 to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables. The seasonal GSFMNP

is offered **June through September**. This program helps reduce food insecurity by providing access to farm-fresh produce to older adults. The AAA collaborated with **five (5) certified Georgia farmers** who traveled throughout the region.

#### **Senior Hunger Coalition Initiative**


The Coastal Senior Hunger Coalition (CSHC) is a collaborative of various agencies, community partners, universities, senior centers, community centers, faith-based communities, food banks, food pantries, food trucks, farmers, in-home providers, volunteers, and those with vested interests to reduce senior hunger. CSHC met virtually this past year and attended DHS's virtual Annual Senior Hunger Summit. Through this initiative, the AAA issued a mini grant to Pete Jackson Farms to implement four Winter Senior Farmer Markets and 167 older adults were served. Winter Farmer's Markets targeted older adults who did not attend a senior center. The markets were held around the Thanksgiving and Christmas Holidays.

#### Aging Disability Resource Connection (ADRC)

The ADRC is a coordinated system dedicated to providing comprehensive information about publicly and privately financed long-term supports that empower older adults and individuals with

disabilities to make informed decisions about their well-being. **ADRC Counselors completed 1,072 Telephone Assessments** for individuals seeking services in their homes and community under two different programs.

- Elderly & Disabled Waiver Program (EDWP) Assessments 412 Assessments Completed: This program is funded by Georgia Medicaid through the Georgia Department of Community Health and available to anyone over the age of 21 with a physical disability meeting nursing home level of care. There is currently no wait list for EDWP Services in our region, and clients are referred after assessment and selection of an EDWP Case Management Agency.
- Home & Community-Based Services (HCBS) Assessments 660 Assessments Completed: This program is funded through the Georgia Department of Human Services, Division of Aging Services and is available to anyone 60 and older. There is currently a waitlist for most HCBS programs, and referrals occur when openings are available.



Nursing Home Transitions - In 2023, 129 people who were residents of nursing homes received Options Counseling to learn about services and programs to support them should they leave the nursing home. Eighteen individuals left the Nursing Home and returned to the community with the assistance of our Transitions Programs.

**Information and Referral Assistance** - The ADRC also maintains a detailed database that contains over 23,000 private-pay agencies and publicly funded service programs. Information was provided to **1,428** different individuals requesting


information on community resources.

#### **Assistive Technology Program**

The AAA is committed to helping people access technology that helps make everyday life more manageable and leisure time more fun! The AAA houses an **on-site Assistive Technology Lab** set up like a studio apartment, allowing individuals to place their hands on items that assist with mobility, dementia care, vision loss, communication problems, hearing loss, and much more.







The ADRC continued to provide equipment to callers when tasks like bathing or homemaking were going undone most of the time. Some of the more popular items included: transfer benches, bath chairs, bath lifts, safety rails, bidets, robotic vacuums, long-handled scrub brushes and brooms, washable bed/chair pads, no-contract emergency alert systems, dementia items, and items to combat caregiver stress. Due to increased funding from ARPA, we were able to continue

to address isolation and focus on giving people equipment that enabled them to be independent instead of putting them on a waiting list for a traditional service.

- 254 people received equipment through the regular assessment process.
  - o 62% of satisfaction surveys were returned.
  - o 76.3% reported they were using all the items provided to them.
  - o 87% reported they were using all or most of the items provided to them.
- 132 people received equipment through a special consultation process designed to assist those who felt isolated during the pandemic or those with unique health issues.
  - o 71% of satisfaction surveys were returned.
  - o 65% reported they were using all the items provided to them.
  - o 87% reported they were using all or most of the items provided to them.

#### Friends of Disabled Adults & Children (FODAC)

FODAC is a statewide and national provider of used home health care equipment, mobility aids, and daily living devices for people with disabilities. Their home office is located in Stone Mountain, Georgia, and they are in the process of opening a satellite office in Savannah in FY24. Fourteen people from the coastal region received 28 Home Medical equipment items in FY23. The AAA is also a designated drop-off site for used equipment. Anyone who wishes to donate equipment can drop their items off at the CRC, and equipment is sent to FODAC for repairs and sanitation and then redistributed to those in need.

#### **Quality Assurance - Customer Feedback**

Approximately **542 clients** receiving Home and Community Based services were randomly selected to provide the AAA feedback on the quality of services they received. **More than 187 client satisfaction surveys were completed**: a response rate of 35%. Survey results were favorable, and most clients indicated that the services they received through the AAA improved their overall health or everyday life.



#### PLANNING AND GOVERNMENT SERVICES

he Planning and Government Services Department (P&GS) serves as the regional voice for Comprehensive Planning, Economic Development, and Geographic Information Systems (GIS), working with local government partners to articulate and implement a shared vision for Coastal Georgia. Throughout this year, our team continued to execute this mission throughout the CRC region.

Our team has benefited our communities by offering a diverse, robust toolbox of expertise. From the development of comprehensive plans, maintaining GIS databases for our local governments, or managing various construction projects, our team strives to offer services our local government partners need most.

To successfully implement our service-minded mission, our team understands the value of maintaining and forming new connections with local officials, both new and old, to assist our communities with their planning needs. The team's dedication to our local government partners has resulted in substantial regional impact. Here is a snapshot of our successes this past fiscal year:

#### **Project Highlights**

Chatham County has contracted with the CRC to administer roughly \$25 million in CDBG Funding. This grant from the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) was awarded to develop a new Second Harvest Food Bank facility in the County. Including private investment, this \$42 million dollar project will greatly increase Second Harvest's performance outcomes, addressing the increase of food insecurity in the region following the Covid-19 Pandemic.

Additionally, Glynn County was awarded a \$3.5 million-dollar CDBG grant from DCA to expand their Second Harvest Food Bank facility. The CRC is also serving as grant administrator for this project.

Both grants were awarded in 2022, and construction is expected to be completed by December of 2023.

GIS staff partnered with the Southern Georgia Regional

Commission (SGRC) to develop a standardized process for participation in **Phase 4** of **GDOT's Roadway Element Validation and Mapping Program**. All regional commissions in the State will utilize the standards developed by the CRC and SGRC, with Phase 4 anticipated to begin statewide in January 2024. On the local level, our GIS staff continued to provide **911 data management** and other **GIS services** to **Liberty, Camden, McIntosh**, and **Long** counties.

Lastly, the P&GS staff assisted **Bike Walk Golden Isles** with the development of a **Glynn County Bike and Walk Map pamphlet**. The materials highlight existing bike and pedestrian infrastructure and includes key attractions and safety information.



#### Planning for the Future

Looking into the coming year, our team remains committed to fostering new and strengthening existing partnerships with local governments in the region. In addition to providing our regular services, our team has an ambitious agenda for special projects in the coming year. The team will update our Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy to capture the abundance of economic development and growth occurring in the region. Additionally, the team will continue work on a Regional Housing Study to capture housing data in the region and provide guidance on the challenges confronting communities in providing affordable housing. And lastly, the CRC has partnered with federal, state, and local governments to acquire updated orthoimagery. The flight is anticipated to take place in early 2024 with new imagery delivery expected by the end of 2024.

he mission of the CRC's Financial Services Department is to provide professional, responsible fiscal management and stewardship with accurate financial reporting encompassing integrity, accountability and exceptional customer service.

The Financial Services Department manages all internal and external financial activities of the CRC. The Department runs all financial operations required for the day-to-day maintenance of the CRC's finances such as:

- accounts payable;
- accounts receivable;
- payroll;
- · cash management;
- · capital budgeting;
- · financial analysis and reporting; and
- internal control procedures.

The Department supports other departments in the CRC by tracking the funding status and expenditure levels of grants received; submitting required reports to grantor agencies; and assuring compliance with federal, state, and local regulations for programs and funding received by the CRC.

The Department plays an integral role in reviewing contracts, bids and proposals; monitoring the status of grants and programs in relation to contractual commitments; preparing requisite financial reports for grantor agencies; and monitoring the performance of subcontractors and their compliance with required guidelines, procedures and reporting.

For the FY23, the total combined revenues for the CRC was \$14,392,753. Total expenses were \$13,737,206. The following table shows the revenues and expense for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2023:

Detailed information concerning the CRC's financial condition can be found in the CRC's 2023 **Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR)**. The purpose of the report is to provide the Council, management, staff, the public and other interested parties with detailed information reflecting the CRC's financial condition. The report also satisfies state law to publish a complete set of financial statements presented in conformity with **Generally Accepted Accounting Principles** (GAAP) and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards by a firm of licensed certified public accountants.

The accounting firm of McNair, McLemore, Middlebrooks & Co., LLC audited the CRC's 2023 ACFR. The auditors issued an unmodified (clean) opinion. It was the auditor's opinion that the financial statements of the CRC, for FY23, presented fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the CRC. The auditor's report also noted that the CRC complied with the requirements of major federal awards and that no deficiencies in internal control over compliance were identified. It should also be noted that there were no findings or questioned costs.


The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) awarded a Certificate of Achievement (COA) for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the CRC for it's ACFR for FY22. This was the 14th consecutive year the CRC received this prestigious award. In order to be awarded a COA, the CRC has to publish an easily readable and efficiently organized ACFR. The report must satisfy both GAAP and applicable legal requirements. A COA is valid for a period of one year only. We believe that our current ACFR continues to meet the COA Program's requirements and we are submitting it to GFOA to determine eligibility for another certificate.

It is the desire of the CRC Council to provide the highest level of service at the most economical cost to its member governments. The CRC actively participates in regional planning with State and Federal agencies, and counties and municipalities within the CRC to maximize services to the region's citizens and to provide those services as economically reasonable as possible.



#### TRANSPORTATION SERVICES



he purpose of the regional transit service is to provide a coordinated transportation system that addresses the needs of the general public and designated human service agencies. The foundation of the rural, regional coordinated system has provided the framework to directly serve the various components of our regional communities. Our goals are to focus on customer service, staff development and improved operations.

FY23 has been one of the most challenging years since the inception of the transit program. The delay in receiving new buses forced us to continue using older buses that were breaking down and needed expensive repairs. In addition, we had 30 catalytic converters stolen from our bus fleet throughout the region. Unfortunately, even though we had them parked in fenced areas, it did not deter the thieves and they cut through the chain link fences. With additional funds received from GDOT, we are purchasing catalytic converter guards to prevent future thefts, which will save money in the future. Bids have been received and once a vendor has been selected, the guards should be installed by the end of September 2023.

#### **OPERATIONS**

In FY23, we finally received 16 new buses; four earmarked for the Statesboro system, and 12 distributed throughout the 10-county region.

Our most impactful event for FY23 was the actual implementation of the much-awaited Statesboro Area Transit (SAT) system. The four new buses were wrapped to identify the City system. City staff developed two routes, serviced by alternating buses operating a hybrid system which has a "fixed route" pattern with 30+ bus stops throughout the City.






#### TRANSPORTATION SERVICES


Ridership continues to grow as the City has developed a website and printed literature to promote the service. The CRC's Planning Department is working to construct a Google Map for ease of access by City residents.

We continue to have discussions regarding a **cooperative agreement with ModivCare** to **transport** some of their **clients to medical facilities** in our region. ModivCare would use the current QRyde scheduling system via the CRC Call Center when scheduling customers and pay the CRC on a per trip basis. This partnership would promote **GDOT's new "Let's Ride" campaign** to increase awareness and utilization of Georgia's public transit systems.

Ridership continues to rebound from the dramatic reduction of trips attributed to the COVID pandemic. As the chart illustrates, provided trips increased by 14% over the past year, and should continue to increase. Trip purpose categories remain constant with medical, employment, and access to Senior centers as the most dominant.



## **FY23 Trip Purpose**




#### **CAPITAL INITATIVES**

The Transportation Program also received funding for capital improvement initiatives that will increase the operating efficiency of the program. This funding is made possible by GDOTs Transit Trust Fund Program which is funded by the Transit Trust Fund (TTF). During the 2020 legislative session, the Georgia General Assembly passed HB 105 (as codified at O.C.G.A. § 48-13-140) establishing fees on for-hire ground transport service, intended to fund transit projects within the State.

During the 2021 legislative session, the Georgia General Assembly passed HB 511 (as codified at O.C.G.A. § 48-13-141) establishing the Georgia TTF as a separate fund in the State Treasury, with annual appropriations of



for-hire ground transportation fees. The GDOT Commissioner is the trustee of the Georgia TTF.




Potential location of secure parking area

Subsequently, in the FY23 Budget, funds were appropriated to the GDOT TTF, to be dedicated for use by one or more transit providers to fund transit projects. The CRC will use its allocation for several projects to strengthen and complement the regional transportation program.

One project will be the construction of a secure parking area for our buses and agency vehicles at our Darien location. This will include a fenced in permeable parking area with lighting, gate, and installation of new light poles on the CRC access road. A mobile light for our Savannah office will also be purchased. In addition, tablets, mounts, and cameras will be purchased for the buses.

The second project will be the renovation of office space at the Darien facility to create a driver training classroom. Other capital improvements include painting window and door frames, metal doors, and baseboards within the Darien office; purchase of computers and related equipment; a marketing/

outreach initiative to promote the importance of our regional rural transit program; and, the integration of the proposed ModivCare partnership which will enhance access to medical services for the region's residents.
